



NORTH SHORE SCENIC DRIVE

Beginning at Canal Park in Duluth, Minnesota's North Shore Scenic Drive is a journey through an unspoiled wilderness that kisses the sweeping shoreline of the world's largest freshwater lake. The breathtaking cliffs and beaches of Lake Superior's beautiful North Shore are bordered by the Sawtooth Mountains and thousands of acres of pine, aspen and birch trees. Rivers and streams make their rocky way to the lake, forging dazzling waterfalls along the way. Lighthouses recall the awesome power of the mighty lake, and dozens of trails allow visitors to experience the North Shore's natural beauty up close. Friendly communities are home to cultural and historic museums and exhibits, as well as unique shopping, dining and lodging. You may wish to drive slowly and stop often, as the North Shore Scenic Drive reaches its destination at Canadian Border all too soon!

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HIGHWAY 61 (ALL-AMERICAN ROAD)

It's still here. Designated by the National Byway Center as one of the most beautiful drives in America, Highway 61 has been named an All-American Road. This breathtaking section of highway, which runs more than 154 miles from Duluth to the Canadian border, is the northernmost tip of one of America's most fabled thoroughfares.

Scenic Highway 61 is dotted with mom and pop shops and small towns, and winds through what is quite possibly the most amazing natural splendor you've ever seen.



SKYLINE PARKWAY

Our in-town scenic byway, this 25-mile drive boasts some of the best views of Duluth, Superior and the big lake. Rising 700 feet above the city, Skyline Parkway winds along the lake's prehistoric shoreline, towering over the St. Louis River, northwestern Wisconsin and downtown Duluth. Follow this natural cliffside terrace from I-35 at Spirit Mountain, around Enger Tower, over a dozen tumbling waterfalls, across Hawk Ridge and down the secluded boulevard known as Seven Bridges Road. Take an hour, or two, or three, and explore our famous Skyline—every inch of it is worth it.

Cruise the curving, historic Skyline Parkway for stunning views hundreds of feet above Lake Superior and the cities of Duluth and Superior.

For a panoramic view of the Twin Ports, climb the steps of iconic Enger Tower. The five-story bluestone observation tower is located in Enger Park off Skyline Drive. The Tower was dedicated in 1939 by Norway's Crown Prince and Princess to memorialize Norwegian immigrant Bert Enger's generous gift of parkland. Upon being restored in 2011, it was rededicated by Norway's Queen Sonja and King Harald, who'd been here at age 7 with dad, Olav.

For a guided tour, signs within the park invite smartphone and cellphone users to scan or text for insightful stories about the history of the park, city and landscape.
